The town is an ideal location for individuals, families, and businesses, as our residents and visitors experience competitive quality of life,


a vibrant local economy, and community engagement.

5 Historic, Down to our Roots

Thomas Heyward, Jr. (July 28, 1746 - March 6, 1809)

was a signer of the United States Declaration of Independence as a representative of South Carolina. He was born in St. Luke's Parish, South Carolina and educated at home. He was elected to the Continental Congress in 1775 and signed the Declaration of Independence in 1776. Heyward returned to South Carolina in 1778 to serve as a judge. Thomas Heyward is entombed near the Old House community in Ridgeland.

The Battle of Honey Hill was the third battle of Sherman's March to the Sea, fought November 30, 1864, during the American Civil War. It did not involve Major General William T. Sherman's main force, marching from Atlanta, Georgia, to Savannah, but was a failed Union Army expedition under Maj. Gen. John P. Hatch that attempted to cut off the Charleston and Savannah Railroad in support of Sherman's projected arrival in Savannah. The expedition maps and guides proved wore of regulars and militia, under Col. Charles J. Colcock, with a battery of seven guns across the road. Determined attacks were launched by U.S. Colored Troops (including the 54 th Massachusetts), but the position of the Federal force was such that only one section of artillery could be used at a time. and the Confederates were too well entrenched to be disloged. Fighting kept up until dark when

Hatch, realizing the impossibility of successfully attacking or turning the flank of the enemy, withdrew to his transports at Boyd's Neck, having lost 89 men killed, 629 wounded, and 28 missing. The Confederate casualties amounted to 8 killed and 39 wounded. 1st Lt. O.W. Bennett was awarded the Medal of Honor. The battlefield is within the town limits of Ridgeland and is preserved as a park with interpretive trails to get the full experience.

Ridgeland-Claude Dean O Airport Expansion

In partnership with Jasper County, the FAA, and the SCAC the project will include a new 4,200foot runway while converting the existing runway into a taxiway. The extended runway will allow for larger planes and/or helicopters to land which will allow business planes to land as well as cater to private aviation enthusiasts.

A Real Sense of Community


